Water Conservation

Lake Durango gets water from Lake Nighthorse. District water is a mix of our well water and water purchased from Lake Durango. When our wells are producing a reduced amount of water, we supplement it more with the purchased water from Lake Durango. So yes, we do have water. However, REMEMBER that we still live in the high desert Southwest environment and are in a prolonged drought so please act and plan accordingly. If you have been thinking about xeriscape, this would be a good time to pull the trigger. In the current climate, lawns and gardens will take a lot more water than usual; and water from Lake Durango is expensive and is not going to get any cheaper.



The district recommends that all residents conserve water.

Learning to use water wisely indoors and outdoors is vital where we live.

Slow Down

Summer is a time when kids are out at all times of day playing, riding bikes, and perhaps chasing a ball into the street. SLOW DOWN AND USE EXTRA CAUTION when driving through the neighborhood. While there is a posted 25 mph speed limit around the neighborhood – drivers are advised to use a lower speed appropriate to the conditions whether that's an icy road or approaching a playground or seeing children playing in a yard. Remember, this is a residential neighborhood. Take an extra minute and please slow down.

Pond Mosquito Control Update

As the pond had shrunk drastically in the last several months, we requested that the Animas Mosquito Control District (AMCD) come out for a recheck. The pond water level is now such that the briquettes are not as effective, and the minnows can't get to some of the pockets of water on the edge. The district contracted with AMCD treat the appropriate areas monthly to control mosquitos. See below for ways you can help control mosquitos.

Pond Status Update:

At the last board meeting, two residents attended with questions about the status of the pond as well as next steps. The Board thought this would be of interest to other residents as well. The district continues to be committed to conserving water resources by not pumping water into the pond. The pond continues to naturally shrink due to evaporation and low run-off. The district is consulting with the Army Corps of Engineers to determine if they have any jurisdiction over the pond. This process will take many months. If the Army Corps of Engineers decides that the pond is not a protected wetland, then the district will engage in a process of steps to determine the best ways to manage that portion of greenspace for our residents, wildlife, and water systems. This process will include providing an opportunity for residents to attend a board meeting when we have more information to share.

Pond Does Not Provide Fire Suppression Benefit

The district received an email about the pond being utilized for fire protection. We double-checked with a current Aerial Firefighter for the U.S. Forest Service. He detailed why the pond would not be used for fire suppression. His summary: In my professional opinion the pond does not provide any added benefit for fire suppression.

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The most logical dip site in the immediate area for helicopters, based in and around Durango, is Lake Durango or Lake Nighthorse both of which can support continuous water operations without the added complexities.

There would be no logical reason for the pond to be used for drafting water or used to support a pump and sprinkler system when the neighborhood has fire hydrants that are easily accessed and can support this operation. The water is better used in the hydrant system where there is no loss to ground seepage and evaporation.

The best thing that homeowners can do to help mitigate the effects of a fire in the neighborhood are to follow Firewise recommendations for home preparation.

Wildfire Mitigation – Creating Defensible Space

Homeowners are advised to clean up the needles from roofs and gutters along with other mitigation. Remove Your Dead Trees

This is a great time to remove your dead or sick trees. It is good to do from a fire mitigation perspective as well as keeping other trees on your property and surrounding area healthy.



Eliminate Mosquito Breeding Grounds



Please do your part in eliminating breeding grounds for mosquitoes by checking for standing water around your homes and getting rid of it. This small effort will help protect yourself, your family and your neighbors from mosquito-borne diseases. Mosquitoes breed in standing water. Drain any

areas where water sits – including flowerpots and bird baths, pet bowls, gutters and construction materials – at least twice a week.

Be considerate



Nice weather means more windows are open, day and night. Please be considerate of your neighbors. Revving engines, barking dogs and loud music can all be annoying to your

neighbors. So that all residents can enjoy our streets and trails, please also be considerate by keeping your dogs on a leash and picking up after them.
